

Facts About MWCD




- Created in 1933, in accordance with ORC, Chapter 6101 (Political subdivision of the State of Ohio)
- Largest conservancy district in Ohio, covers 1/5 of state and all or portions of 18 counties
- Manages 54,000 acres for public use
 - * 16,000 acres of water surface at 10 lakes
 - * 38,000 acres of land
- Partnership with U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)
 - * USACE owns and operates dams
 - * MWCD manages reservoirs behind dams
- To date, system has prevented more than \$7
 billion in potential property damage and saved
 countless lives, while providing a water
 resource for public uses

Maintenance Needs

- Age of system and infrastructure
- Dam Safety/Dam Safety Assurance
- Sedimentation
- Erosion
- Water quality threats
- Conservation pool protection/maintenance

Why Assessment Program? Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District

- Flood reduction and water conservation needs in Muskingum River Watershed led to construction of 14 dams and reservoirs
- MWCD assessment established to maintain aging infrastructure, enhance works of district and support conservation efforts in the watershed



Assessment Methodology

- Impervious area used as an indicator of runoff
 - Need for reservoirs based upon control of runoff
 - Water quality issues are directly tied to runoff
 - Erosion and sedimentation are the results of runoff
 - Reasonable to apportion benefits based upon estimated runoff
 - Methodology recognizes contribution of runoff from all properties in Muskingum River Watershed

Assessment Update



- Assessment and work originally scheduled to begin in 2008
- Ohio General Assembly approves moratorium on MWCD assessment for 2008 (December 2007)
- Ohio Senate forms work group to review MWCD, assessment and methodology – several meetings held
- Ohio General Assembly approves legislation to lift moratorium in summer 2008
- MWCD Board of Directors votes to levy assessment in 2009 – (September 26, 2008)
- Data delivered to auditors' offices in 18-county region
- Collection to begin First quarter of 2009 with real estate tax collection statements
- "Credits" program for assessment to begin in 2009

Why Credits Program?



- In support of mission and assessment goals, credits program encourages and recognizes individual efforts to:
 - Raise awareness of runoff and water quality issues
 - Produce environmental benefits
 - Encourage Best Management Practices (BMPs)
 - Share significant BMPs with watershed community through newsletters and media
- * Financial incentive to encourage participation by individual parcel owners for water quality improvements

Program Guidelines



- Regulatory and technical basis
- Participation based on parcel, not property owner
- Must provide a benefit to MWCD greater than the cost to administer
- Must not harm financial integrity of assessment program and MWCD's ability to address needs of aging infrastructure
- Reasonable to administer and implement
- Receive public support and involvement

Program Overview



- Application/Review process
 - Contact information
 - Property information
 - Description of project for credit
 - Available categories for credit
 - Applicant certification
 - Application available online or U.S. Mail
 - Credit application approved, denied or further information required
 - In first year (2009), check issued by MWCD
 - Subsequent years property assessment reduced in real estate tax statement (parcel owner receives credit notification directly from MWCD)

Program Overview



- MWCD reserves right to verify projects
- Appeals process
 - Administrative review
 - Board of Appraisers
 - Board of Directors
- Credits program not codified in ORC or OAC

Program Timeline



- January-March 2009 Applications accepted on existing parcel projects
- April 2009 Applications reviewed
- May 2009 Notification to parcel owners
- June 2009 Credit payments by MWCD to parcel owners for entire year
- January-March 2010 (and yearly thereafter) – New applications accepted

Financial Snapshot



- Annual assessment budget \$10.3 million
- Major commitments to federal government as local cost-share sponsor for dam safety projects
- Collection potential reduced significantly by parcel adjacency (750,000 parcels to less than 500,000)
- Project budget reduced in response to Ohio General Assembly input
- Federal local cost-share amounts increase significantly

Financial Snapshot



- Potential impact of credits program on overall budget
- Estimated at \$250,000 to \$1.25 million
- MWCD cost-share obligation \$93.2 million to \$123.1 million according to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers



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
