# MWCD Forestry Continues Proactive Forest Management in 2021

Over the last four years, tree giveaways for cottage sites have been conducted throughout the district. Forestry held the 2021 Tree Giveaway for MWCD Atwood, Piedmont, and Seneca Lake cottage lessees on April 10th. The event had 80 participants and resulted in a total of 775 trees planted around the lake areas. Additionally, 9,500 trees were planted at the former Atwood Golf Course. The planting covered 22 acres and was completed in less than two days. To help with the growth of the trees, hunting is now allowed in the area.

Native trees either distributed or planted included:

- Dogwood
- Redbud
- Paw Paw
- Persimmon
- Sugar and Red Maple
- Red, White, Pin, and Swamp White Oak

- Bitternut Hickory
- Yellow and Tulip Poplar
- Black Cherry
- Blackgum
- River Birch

MWCD foresters manage 34,000 acres of forests on MWCD properties. Management of the forests includes: maintaining an extensive inventory, controlling invasive species where needed, monitoring forest insects and pathogens, planting trees, and achieving wildlife habitat and silvicultural goals through a proactive forest management approach.



## Fishing Line Disposal Bins Installed

Visitors will now find fishing line disposal bins located at all our Lakes and Parks. MWCD Rangers, Park and Marina staff worked hard over the spring assembling and installing disposal bins uniquely designed to collect fishing line only. A total of 35 bins have been strategically installed at high-volume fishing areas throughout the district to provide an easy and convenient way for anglers to discard old, excess, or severed fishing line in areas where trashcans and dumpsters may not be found. This new initiative is one example of MWCD's efforts to engage our visitors and mitigate a fraction of the overall litter issue found at MWCD Lakes and Parks.

"Keeping our waterways tangle free ensures healthier wildlife habitats, increases water quality, and prevents injuries and potential accidents," said Ethan Zucal, MWCD Engagement and Outreach Coordinator. "The fishing line disposal bins are a simple way for fishermen and women to discard line that can no longer be used rather than dropping it in the lakes or leaving it on the shoreline."

Visitors are encouraged to use the disposal bins, trashcans, and dumpsters when they dispose of fishing line.



## **MWCD Water Quality Program: Summer 2021**

In May, MWCD Water Quality Coordinator, Matt Thomas, worked with Kent State University students as part of their Environmental Studies course. Their field work focused on the study of linkages between local land use and water quality. Students traveled to several lakes and streams around Carroll County to explore different habitats and gain hands-on experience of tools and techniques that limnologists (water scientists) use to assess water quality. The trip culminated in meeting staff with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and learning the functions, engineering, and mission of the Leesville Dam.

The annual kick-off meeting for our Citizen Lake Awareness and Monitoring (CLAM) Program was held June 7. This is a long-standing partnership with the Ohio Lake Management Society which provides the logistics, training, and assistance for our group of citizen scientists. We truly value the service these volunteers provide every summer, as they play a large role in our sampling efforts. In 2020, the group collected over 100 samples for E. coli and 54 samples for cyanotoxin. Aside from taking frequent samples and recording data, they essentially become the eyes and ears for many of the lakes within the District, helping us maintain current lake conditions in real time.

Water quality is important for recreational users to know and understand, especially anglers, boaters, and swimmers. The MWCD Water Quality Program monitors the lake waters regularly at all 10 MWCD lakes during the recreational season. # Tappan Marina and Restaurant Opening Slated for Summer

While construction continues on the \$4.4 million Tappan Marina and Restaurant building renovation project, the grand opening is planned for later this summer. Travelers on State Route 250 have had a front-row view to the construction progress, which features a new 250-seat restaurant on the main floor of the marina, including seating for over 100 guests on a covered deck overlooking the lake.

Matt Donohoe and Shari Lewis, owners of the Dennison Yard, Dennison, Ohio, have been selected to operate the restaurant and are anxiously awaiting to announce the grand opening of Waters Edge Kitchen + Bar. "We are very excited to provide a full-service restaurant and bar where boaters and visitors will enjoy a delicious meal, in a comfortable, relaxing environment – with a spectacular view!" said Shari Lewis. "We also plan to offer carry-out menu items that boaters can order and enjoy while relaxing on the water."

The lower level of the marina will be home to MWCD's Tappan Marina operations. It will also feature pontoon and fishing boat rentals, boating

Despite construction, marina operations are currently open. Pontoon rentals, gas, and seasonal docking is available for the 2021 season. MWCD Rangers have joined the ranks of nearly 75 percent of Ohio's Law Enforcement officers by receiving the Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency Certification – a program developed by the State of Ohio to improve community-police relations and find solutions to the tensions and concerns between community members and the police that serve them.

"We hold our Rangers to high standards and offer the most up-to-date training to make certain they know how to handle a wide variety of situations they may face."

MWCD received final certification for Group One standards which includes Use of Force, and Recruitment and Hiring. MWCD will continue to pursue certification for Groups Two, Three and Four.

To obtain the certification, agencies must meet statewide standards set by the U.S. Department of Justice, the Ohio Office of Criminal Justice Services, and the Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency Certification Program. The Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board was formed in 2015 to strengthen community and police relations.

"Our Rangers work countless hours to ensure the safety of not only the guests who visit the MWCD lakes, but also the surrounding communities," said John Maxey, MWCD Chief Ranger. "We hold our Rangers to high standards and offer the most up-to-date training to make certain they know how to handle a wide variety of situations they may face."

It can range from opportunities to educate the community about our natural resources, all the way to de-escalation of a tense situation or providing mutual aid to nearby departments. Achieving this certification shows the community the level of service we aim to provide."

MWCD Rangers are required to be certified police officers within the State of Ohio and have full police powers on MWCD property and adjacent property. To become a certified Police Officer, they must go through intensive training to complete the Ohio Police Officer Training Academy. The MWCD employs 34 Rangers who are guided by professional policies that are written by Lexipol, which are nationally recognized as Best Practices for Law Enforcement Agencies.

Job duties for a MWCD Ranger can vary daily from patrolling camp areas, cottage

areas, and lakes, to providing
Ohio Boater or Hunter
Education Courses to the
community. They also conduct
safety checks, respond to noise
complaints, criminal violations,
and assist other nearby agencies.
Lake Rangers complete vessel
inspections, investigate boating
accidents, and patrol the
waterways to ensure safety.

"I am very proud of the MWCD
Ranger Department for this
accomplishment," said Craig
Butler, MWCD Executive Director.
"Throughout the year, our Rangers
receive many hours of education
and training to ensure that we are
adopting the most up-to-date policing
standards, and this certification validates the
efforts we have made. We strive to develop
relationships within our communities to ensure

a safe atmosphere within our parks, cottage areas, and beyond."



# Partnership With OWDA to Improve Water Quality in MWCD Region



A core mission of MWCD is maintaining good water quality in our lakes and rivers for the benefit and enjoyment of the community. "We are excited to announce a partnership with the Ohio Water Development Authority to invest \$5 million to improve community wastewater treatment in the MWCD region," said Craig Butler, MWCD Executive Director. "This new program builds on the current commitments to invest in the vitality of our parks, marinas, and communities. Having excellent water quality is what is responsible for attracting millions of visitors to our parks, lakes, and marinas annually."

The latest estimates (2012) from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are that over \$271 billion are needed to fully fund necessary community wastewater improvement needs nationally. Ohio's needs are staggering at over \$14 billion, with small communities reporting needs of over \$1.5 billion. This is despite having programs that have already invested billions of dollars to build, enhance, and replace critical infrastructure.

The MWCD Board of Directors recently approved a partnership with the Ohio Water Development Authority (OWDA) to invest \$5 million in the existing Freshwater Loan Program to assist communities within our jurisdictional boundary to build and improve wastewater treatment systems.

For qualifying communities, MWCD will "buy" or subsidize the interest from any OWDA
Freshwater Loans to defray or lessen overall project costs.

"We feel strongly about investing in our communities and protecting the waters within the conservancy district. This is a way for us to do both and we are proud to be a partner with OWDA in this important program," says Butler. The OWDA program is one funding source communities use to finance expensive wastewater/stormwater upgrades, often required by Ohio/US EPA because of poor performance and negative impacts to water quality.

Eligible borrowers include departments, divisions, or other units of state government, watershed districts, soil and water conservation districts, municipal corporations, counties, townships, and other political subdivisions, special water districts, including county and regional sewer and water districts, conservancy districts, sanitary districts, sewer districts, or any other public corporation or agency having the authority to acquire, construct, or operate wastewater or water management facilities.

Interested applicants can submit an application through the portal at www.OWDA.org.

Guidelines and instructions for applying can be found there as well. An application will be presented to the OWDA Board for approval after it has been determined that the local government is able to repay the loan. MWCD will also complete a review to ensure it meets its eligibility requirements during this time.

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
